Dr. Karimian earned her doctorate in Neuropsychology from Pepperdine University's Graduate School of Education and Psychology in 2016. She joined the LACPA Board of Directors as a member of the Student Leadership Committee in 2013 and received the Distinguished Service to LACPA by a Graduate Student Award in 2015. After serving as the Student Leadership Committee Chair, she served as Chair of the Continuing Education Committee from 2018 to 2020. Since 2019, she was employed as a Neuropsychologist at the West Los Angeles Veterans Administration. Dr. Karimian's Iranian cultural heritage ran as a proud thread through her professional life, and she took an active role in the Iranian Psychological Association of America.

Absent from the facts of her career are the intense feelings of love and admiration exhibited in the outpouring of memories about Dr. Karimian. The following pages are a collection of these memories and photos of Dr. Karimian from LACPA events over the years.
